1	Antibiotic-free nutrition for optimum production: Join Toby Doak from Alltech as he discusses nutritional strategies to meet the local and international market demand for antibiotic free lamb production.	
2	Drench resistance – what's really happening: Virbac's Dr Tim Elliott draws on the latest data on the prevalence of drench resistance in the Australian sheep flock that will inform best management practice.	
3	Technological advances in lamb stunning: Engineer Warren Leamy from Mitchell Engineering Food Equipment discusses the technological advances in lamb stunning and lamb processing, highlighting the FREUND slaughter tools.	
4	Parasites and Forages: Parasitism is a major issue for sheep producers and in this session, DLF Seeds brings Dr Glenn Judson to LambEx to discuss the drawbacks of relying solely on drenches. He emphasises the need for a multifaceted approach, incorporating nutrition and innovative fodder crops to combat parasites effectively and aid with drench resistance.

Seminar 1 - Latest Research and Innovation

Hosted by the Sheep Industry Fund of South Australia Host Welcome | Jane Kellock, LambEx

The power of the potential to quantify pain: A suite of tests may soon be able to detect or even quantify the level of pain a sheep is experiencing or has experienced in the past. And while pain relief solutions are now widely used, the concept of having access to objective pain measurement has the capacity to bring welfare management to a new paradigm. It's early days yet but as University of Adelaide's **Dan Barratt** explains, there are several options that draw from first human and then bovine research that makes this a potential future management tool.

The genomics evolution in sheep: The door has been opened to a new range of genetic tools that give real power to commercial Merino producers in terms of accuracy and traits. **Dr Alex Ball** explains the difference this can make on farm.

New rules for engagement with ewe lambs: Jason Trompf releases the findings of a comprehensive research project that sheds new light on the management of ewe lambs for joining, lambing and recovery for second joining. Industry emphasis must shift beyond seeing scanning rates from ewe lambs as the focus, to live lambs weaned from ewe lambs as the end game. The outcomes from this R&D will drive production and profit from this cohort while significantly reducing wastage and improving welfare outcomes, with a series of new rules for engagement with ewe lambs.

The Australian lamb industry roller coaster: What just happened? And what's going to? Widening the profit margins in prime lamb production. Of all of the broadacre commodities, prime lamb has had the highest compound growth rate in price, but has been unable to shake an equally high compounding increase in cost of production. This session delivered by **Sandy McEachern** from Aggregate Ag will explore how producers might consider changes to their production system to widen the margins in prime lamb production.

Mark has a PhD in genetics and a passion for enabling farmers to implement effective genetic strategies to get the most out of their livestock.



Professor Jennie Pryce, Research Director at Agriculture Victoria Research

Professor Jennie Pryce is Research Director at Agriculture Victoria Research and La Trobe University professor, and a leading authority in dairy genetics. Named Australia's top researcher in animal husbandry by The Australian (2019-2022), her academic journey began at the University of Edinburgh, earning her BSc (Hons 1st class) and PhD. Hailing from a UK dairy farming background, her roots deeply influence her work. She has an innate understanding of what is important to livestock producers and an enormous capacity to translate learnings from dairy to apply to other ruminants. Whilst she is first and foremost a geneticist, she is in equal parts a communicator.



Dr Will van Wettere, University Adelaide

Associate Professor Will van Wettere completed his post-graduate training in reproductive physiology, and has spent the last 15 years conducting research focussed on developing novel and adoptable strategies to improve reproductive performance of livestock species. Will heads up a group of researchers who are working towards understanding the interaction between climate and ovine reproduction, how sheep thermoregulate and developing strategies to alleviate heat stress in sheep and other livestock species, as well as improve fertility and neonatal survival in sheep.



Phil Hynd, University Adelaide

Phil is the Emeritus Professor of Animal and Veterinary Sciences at the University of Adelaide in South Australia. He has served in many senior levels of research leadership, including Program Leader for wool Genomics; Program Leader for wool education in the Wool CRC; Head of the Department of Animal Science. Interim Head of the School of Agriculture, Food and Wine, Director of Roseworthy Campus; Chair of The Expert Panel for beef and sheep meat research (Meat and Livestock Australia); and Deputy Head of the School of Animal and Veterinary Sciences. Phil's research has focussed on issues relating to the wool and sheep industries for over 35 years. He pioneered the use of 'barebreech' genetics to provide a permanent solution to mulesing to protect sheep from blowfly strike. He also investigated the potential for intradermal injections to remove breech wrinkle again to protect sheep from blowflies. For many years Phil has advocated and sought alternatives to traditional shearing of sheep. This long road of research has culminated in a recent breakthrough which makes the approach feasible and this technology is now being rapidly developed towards a commercial on-farm process.



Will Barton, CEO, Gundagai Meat Processors (GMP)

GMP was founded in 1974 by the Barton family and forms part of the Barton Group brand, which has a longstanding association with the town of Gundagai dating back to 1874. During his time at GMP since 2014 as CEO, Will has led a multimillion dollar facility expansion project and secured Tier 2 Export Certification. He is passionate about shaping the future of the industry and has been an active member of various committees including the Sheep Sustainability Steering Group, National Agricultural Labour Advisory Committee and the Objective Measurement Adoption & Commercialisation Committee, He was also part of the Red Meat Memorandum of Understanding Taskforce in 2019. In 2021, the Barton family established Gundagai Lamb, which is a new and exciting lamb brand, backed by the family's 100+ years of meat industry experience. Gundagai Lamb will revolutionise the lamb supply chain into the future with innovative approaches to the producer / processor relationship. Prior to joining GMP as CEO, Will was Director of Agribusiness within CBRE Asia-Pacific, the world's largest commercial real estate firm. In 2009, Will completed a Bachelor of Applied Science (Valuation) with Honours First Class, at RMIT. His early career was spent in property valuation roles, specialising in agribusiness assets and studying an Associate Degree in Food Science. Will lives in Gundagai with his wife, Carla, and three children.



Dr Peter McGilchrist, Associate Professor, University of **New England**

Peter is an Associate Professor of meat science at the University of New England in Armidale, NSW. His research revolves around ensuring global consumer satisfaction of Australian red meat. This research covers all aspects of sheep and beef supply-chains focusing on critical control points which affect the

eating quality of meat from on-farm to the consumer with a heavy focus on the relationship between genetics, meat quality and technology to measure meat traits. Peter is a member of the Meat Standards Australia beef and sheepmeat scientific pathways committee and president of the Australian ICMJ Association. Peter passionately imparts his knowledge of rural science, agriculture, and agribusiness to eager undergraduate students at UNE, embracing everything from the richness of soil to the succulence of lamb rumps!

Whilst on an end of season footy trip to Tasmania, he contracted one of the deadliest diseases on the planet, leaving him with horrific internal and external injuries, including the amputations of both of his legs below his knees, as well as numerous other lifesaving surgeries. Mike has faced an incredibly long journey back to health that was aided by a positive outlook, an adaptive mindset and a conscious decision to embrace uncertainty. Mike has a background in the health industry. He is a qualified Counsellor, a highly skilled communicator and a passionate supporter of amputee charity, Limbs 4 Life. He is an official ambassador of Interplast Australia and New Zealand, Ossur, and currently represents Australia in All Abilities Golf. His passion for golf, isn't just about the sport and competing, it's not just for the physical benefits, but for the positive impact he knows it has on his mental health as well.

Ben Pettingill, Legless & Blind

Imagine waking up blind! This was reality for Ben losing 98% of his eyesight overnight at age 16 caused by a rare genetic syndrome, Lebers Hereditary Optic Neuropathy, that had been laying unknowingly dormant in his family for generations. He learned the hard way the importance of focusing his time and energy on what he could control rather than what he couldn't, prioritising his mental health and the vital role of a support network. Ben ensures he doesn't just deliver valuable messages and practical strategies to his audience, he lives them! Everyday he is driven by his commitment to simply, 'Make the Most'. This commitment has seen Ben become the first legally blind person in the world to compete in Spartan Obstacle Course Races, compete in the Southern 80 water skiing race against able bodied competitors and trek the Kokoda Track in Papua New Guinea, not once, but twice. He isn't stopping there either, Ben is now taking on arguably his biggest challenge yet, 3249 BLIND where he will run 3249km's in 2024 for mental health and suicide prevention.



Dr Jason Trompf, Agricultural Consultant, Lambs Alive

Dr Jason Trompf from Lambs Alive has been working as Agricultural Consultant for over 20 years. Jason has a strong background in understanding the drivers and motivators of producers and designing programs that support and enable practice change. Jason undertook his PhD research into farmer behavioral change and adoptive context, identifying ways to increase engagement and impact.
